

Bureau, with headquarters at Montgomery, the Capital. He served with General Swayne as his Adjutant-General until September 1, 1866, when he was mustered out of the Volunteer Army.

In the autumn of 1866 Colonel Cadle was appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury to be Receiver of the First National Bank of Selma, Ala., where he remained until he successfully closed up the affairs of that bank.

He was interested as a coal operator for several years in Alabama. and was connected with the development of a large coal plant located in Blocton, Bibb County, Ala., acting as its General Manager. He later removed to Birmingham, Ala., and from there to Cincinnati, Ohio.

In 1895 he was commissioned under an act of Congress, authorizing the conversion of the Shiloh Battlefield into a National Military Park, to be Chairman of the Commission. "Under the direction of the Secretary of War, three commissioners were to be appointed, each of whom had served at the time of the battle in one of the armies engaged therein, one of whom had served in the Army of the Tennessee, commanded by General Grant, who shall be Chairman of the Commission; one in the Army of the Ohio, commanded by General D. C. Buell; and one in the Army of the Mississippi, commanded by General A. S. Johnston."

Colonel Cadle filled his position as Chairman of the Commission with credit for fifteen years. During this period a wonderful work was accomplished in restoring the scene of the conflict as far as was possible to its original state; in marking the various positions of the
