

Colonel Cadle was admitted to the membership of the Ohio Commandery of the Loyal Legion in 1883. He was elected to its Council in 1886. He was its Junior Vice-Commander in 1888 and 1889, and its Commander in 1900. He served as Treasurer of the Commandery-in-Chief of the Loyal Legion for six years, and at the time of his death he was Chairman of the Council of the Commandery-in-Chief.

Colonel Cadle was the Secretary of the Sherman Statue Committee of the Army of the Tennessee.

In 1898, during the Spanish-American War, the Army and Navy League of Cincinnati was organized, to give aid in every possible manner to our wounded soldiers in Cuba. Colonel Cadle was chosen its First Vice-President, and devoted many weeks of his time in caring for the sick and wounded soldiers as they reached Cincinnati on their way from Cuba to their different homes, seeing that proper nourishment was provided for them, and attending to their comfort as they were transferred from train to train.

He was Department Commander in the State of Alabama of the Grand Army of the Republic from April 9, 1868, to July 21, 1870. He was a member of the Ransom Post, G. A. R., of St. Louis, Mo., and an honorary member of the Jones Post of Cincinnati. From 1886 until he died he was an honored member of the Cincinnati Literary Club. In 1900 he was elected President of the Ohio Society of the Sons of the Revolution.

The Society of the Army of the Tennessee was formed at Raleigh, N. C., on April 14, 1865, and included every officer who had served with honor in that Army.
