



CORNELIUS CADLE, 20

Thomas Cadle, brother of this Cornelius, was the first Cadle to come to America. He had ten children, but none of them married, and therefore he had no direct descendants beyond them. Thus, Cornelius was the progenitor of the present American Cadles, so far as we know. We occasionally see the name Cadle, Cadel and Cadell in different parts of this country, but presume that the people bearing these names are descendants of more recent emigrations to this country.

Cornelius Cadle was born June 23, 1772, on the family estate of Longcroft in the parish of Westbury-on-Severn, Gloucestershire, England. He came to New York in March, 1791, sailing from Bristol, England, in the brig "William," Capt. Dekay. September 1, 1799, in New York, he married Hannah Kidson, a native of Bristol, England, who was then in her 17th year. She died in New York, April 28, 1819. Ten children were born of this union. Mr. Cadle afterward had for a second wife Mary McIntire. No children came from this marriage.

Mr. Cadle was engaged in New York in the importing and sale of fancy woods. His firm owned several vessels trading with the West Indies and were doing a large and lucrative business when the War of 1812 broke out, and the embargo on foreign trade was declared. The firm having some vessels loaded for foreign countries, the em-
