



## HENRY CADLE

Henry Cadle, son of Cornelius and Ruth Lamprey Cadle, was born at Muscatine, Iowa, December 25, 1851. He attended the public schools of his native town till 17 years of age, when he entered his father's lumber office to learn the business. There he remained till July, 1871, when he moved to Princeton, Mo., and engaged in the lumber business on his own account. In June, 1885, he removed to Clinton, Iowa, where he was engaged about a year in the agricultural machinery trade. Thereafter he followed the lumber business at St. Joseph, Mo., Smith Center, Kan., and finally at Bethany, Mo., where he remained from 1890 until his death, which occurred May 28, 1913.

Following this lamentable event, the Missouri Society of the Sons of the Revolution published a memorial pamphlet, of which the title page bore this tribute, signed by the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, President of the Society:

"Faithful unto death." Surely these words give the sum of all that Henry Cadle was and of all he did for our State Society. Was ever a man more faithful to a trust or more diligent in its discharge? He made Bethany the power house for our Society, and he died in harness in the midst of his books and certifying docu-
