

In the pamphlet are also resolutions adopted by the St. Louis, Kansas City, St. Joseph and Springfield Chapters of the Missouri Society, Sons of the Revolution, all expressing the highest and most loving esteem for Mr. Cadle and the deepest sorrow at the irreparable loss caused by his death. Similar appreciative resolutions were adopted by the New York and Illinois Societies, Sons of the Revolution, and by the Bethany Encampment and Rebekah Lodge, I. O. O. F., while letters of tender sympathy and deep grief were written by officers of the Pennsylvania Society and of the General Society, Sons of the Revolution—all these resolutions and letters appearing in the memorial pamphlet.

The memorial adopted by the Kansas City Chapter thus describes certain dominating characteristics of Mr. Cadle:

Henry Cadle was by nature endowed with the instincts of the scholar, serious, earnest, concentrated and analytical. Few had so thoroughly studied and were so familiar with the personalities of early American history as he. Nothing gave him more pleasure than to share the wealth of his knowledge with others whom it would help. There are few members of this Chapter who cannot recall occasions when he has been of help to them. None will fail to remember his happy face when he had been able to render a service, and no one will forget his patient, painstaking work in searching the records for information for the benefit of absolute strangers to whom he was under no obligation, nor his happiness when he succeeded.
