

He was intensely patriotic. While he was not a hero worshipper, he always tried to hold up the great men of early days as models of loyalty that their examples might be followed. His public speeches were always serious—never frivolous—always their burden seemed to be the obligation of his listeners to be worthy sons of worthy sires, and true to the heritage of their forefathers. His often expressed opinion that the obligation of citizenship is as great now as in the days of the revolution was the mainspring of his activities in this society. He was proud of his ancestry and tried to be loyal to the line and a credit to his forbears, but his real inspiration was not his pride of ancestry but the hope that by this means the principles of the fathers might be applied to the conditions of today.

He was a tower of strength, and in his passing this Society and the citizenship of Missouri has lost an honored and valued member.

The following press notice of the obsequies of Mr. Cadle was also included in the pamphlet:

Funeral services of Henry Cadle were held from the Methodist Church Thursday morning, May 29th, and were largely attended; many from over the State and county. The body was taken to the church at 10 o'clock, where it lay in state. Members of the Patriarchs Militant in uniform and several young ladies carrying the beautiful and numerous floral tributes, preceded the hearse. All business houses of the city were closed during the funeral.
