Representatives of the Society of Colonial Wars, Society of the Army of the Tennessee, and the Military Order of the Loyal Legion were also in attendance at the funeral.

At Muscatine the funeral services were held at the home of the brother of deceased, Chas. F. Cadle, who lives on the old homestead. On Decoration Day his body lay in state and funeral services held in the same room where he was born over sixty-one years ago. It is remarkable to note that Mr. Cadle had spent every Christmas Day of his life in the old homestead.
